TRAVELLER COMMUNITY ECONOMIC STATUS

On October 17th, a limited, socially-distanced group gathered at the Poverty and Human Rights stone to mark International Day for the Eradication of Poverty. Peter Mc Verry led the occasion with the Lord Mayor representing the city. The address of the Lord Mayor echoed that of President Michael D Higgins, showing how the pandemic has widened the gap between rich and poor people, and significantly challenges the global goal of eliminating world poverty by 2030.

FOUR TESTIMONIES:

The central part of the event was listening to four testimonies delivered by very brave people who experience struggle, a person in direct provision, a homeless person, a traveller and a person in addiction. Listening to unheard voices was at the heart of the day and the prayer of Joseph Wresinski was read aloud in three languages.

The ceremony was interspersed with songs composed for the occasion by the SAOL Sisters and with poems written during the lockdown by people in poverty. A dramatic presentation highlighted the need to extend equality legislation to protect poor people from socio-economic discrimination. The butterfly as the reminder of change was the logo for the day, and the event closed with a symbolic butterfly gesture by all present. After the absence of a year because of COVID it was great to be able to assemble again in person to honour the struggles of people living in poverty, with a renewed determination to work for a world of justice and dignity.
